SHA took part in a school-wide Day of Service. Upper School students and staff moved off campus to numerous service partners to share their time and talent. Middle School students volunteered at Cradles to Crayons in the morning and took part, along with the Lower School, in the annual Walkathon on campus in support of the Multiple Sclerosis Society, for which they raised over \$500 this year alone.

Mixision Highlights Preparing students for life beyond SHA

Forty-four teams from twenty-seven high schools gathered at the University of Delaware for the 2024 EntreX Delaware Venture Showcase. The head-to-head business pitch event ATREPRENEURSHIP was sponsored by Horn Entrepreneurship's dual enrollment program, EntreX Lab, in conjunction with the University of Delaware. SHA participated for the first time. Seniors Riley Fisher, Makenzie Fisher, and Nora Brannan (pictured left to right) presented their startup business plan and app, Smart Skin—a dermatology portal that allows users to scan their skin, log their results, and connect with dermatologists. Their presentation was the culmination of months of research, analysis, and application, beginning in September as part of a year-long academic course. The team advanced to the Diamond Challenge Showcase in April, competing alongside participants from around the world. While the team fell short of winning the global competition and securing funding, the experience was invaluable, equipping the students with real-world business skills, meaningful connections, and a sense of empowerment!



Kindergarten, Primary Hearts, and Intermediate Hearts students presented their work at Women of Achievement assemblies — a much-anticipated Lower School annual program. The oral presentations, in front of packed audiences of families, peers, faculty, and staff, were the culmination of an intensive Language Arts unit and a shining testament to SHA's public speaking curriculum, which begins in Kindergarten and continues through Grade 12.

Throughout the semester, students chose an inspirational woman who has impacted society. They then conducted research, wrote, edited, and presented their reports, dressed as their Woman of Achievement.





Students gave their Grade 8 Privileges Pitch to Head of School Carla Jantos MacMullen in formal boardroom style. The students collaborated, designed, presented, and negotiated their plan of privileges — exclusively for their grade — for a uniform enhancement, Wise Freedom (independent free time in designated spaces), and a school dance. "One of the biggest highlights of my exchange was definitely the Traditional Tea Ceremony," said Sophia, "as I loved learning about how this specific tradition was passed down through history and how passionate people are about it today. I also loved just distancing myself from the life and country I've lived in my whole life and realizing how big the world is and how something that may seem terrible to me at home is actually more insignificant than it seems in the grand scheme of things."



SHA sent warm send-offs to three longtime employees at the end of the 2023-2024 academic year, each of whom left a positive and lasting impression on our School and students.






